

**MINUTES OF THE 88TH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE AAVSO, HELD  
OCTOBER 28–31, 1999, HYANNIS, MA**

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The AAVSO Finance Committee met during the morning on Thursday, October 28.

The AAVSO Council met on Thursday afternoon, October 28. This meeting was followed by a buffet supper at the hotel for all early-arriving members and guests.

On Friday morning, October 29, there was a well-attended workshop on *Hands-On Astrophysics* (HOA). Papers were presented (see attachment to these minutes) outlining the perspectives of members/observers, students, and educators. AAVSO Director Janet Mattei gave a presentation on VSTAR, the data plotting and analysis software from HOA, and answered questions by the attendees.

The first scientific paper session was held on Friday afternoon, beginning at 1 o'clock. Ten papers were presented, as indicated in the list following these minutes. Following this session, Al Holm presented his report on the Membership Survey, which was then followed by a question and answer period on various issues on observing, observing programs, and Association activities.

Following the dinner hour, Dr. Margarita Karovska presented a very well received talk on "The Sun in Time." This was followed by an eclipse video from Ron Royer, and eclipse photos by Mario Motta.

The Annual Membership Meeting on Saturday, October 30, was called to order at 9:04 a.m. by President Gary Walker.

Martha Hazen, Secretary, gave a summary of the minutes of the 88th Spring Meeting of the AAVSO in Toronto, Ontario. The minutes were accepted as summarized.

The president appointed Gene Hanson, Gerry Samolyk, and Sara Beck to count the ballots for new Councilors.

Past Treasurer Theodore Wales presented the annual report from Treasurer Wayne Lowder, who was unable to attend. He noted that the association almost broke even in the last year. The Ford Fund was up 12% and the Endowment Fund up 6%, while the available cash was only down 1.3%. President Walker thanked Ted for his help in presenting the report.

Director Mattei expressed the AAVSO's thanks to all the committee chairs for their active and excellent work.

Director Mattei read the report of new membership applications approved by the Council on October 28, 1999. Sixty-one applicants were accepted, including 2 junior, 2 sustaining, and 2 sponsored. Thirty percent of the new members heard about the AAVSO from friends and personal contacts. The total membership is now 1109.

Director Mattei announced the decease of the following members: Robert B. Ammons, Robert A. Leitner, Oscar E. Monnig, Gerald Stringer, and James F. Wright. The attendees rose for a moment of silence in memory of their deceased colleagues.

Director Mattei then discussed plans for future meetings:

- The spring meeting will be held April 13-16, 2000, in Huntsville, AL. There will be a special workshop for amateurs on High-Energy Astrophysics; this will take place the first two days of the meeting. The regular meeting will be held on April 15.
- The Annual Meeting will be held in the Cambridge area, probably in Waltham and probably on the last weekend in October.
- The next two spring meetings will be held in Madison, WI (2001), at the invitation of Gerry Samolyk and Bob Manske, and Hawaii (2002), at the invitation of Karen Meech.

Following a short break Gary Walker announced the results of the election for Council. William Dillon and Margarita Karovska were elected to a second term, and Raymond Berg and Arne Henden were elected to their first term.

Director Janet Mattei presented her annual report. The report in its entirety appears in this issue of *JAAVSO*. Some of the highlights of what was a very exciting and successful year:

- a) Our internet connection continues to expand. Security was increased for the website and connection; increased search capability was added to the website; 2700 charts are now on the web; and the site received almost two million hits.
- b) The 9.5 millionth observation was made by Ferenc Puskas of Hungary.
- c) Requests for data are coming more and more through the web. Half are for data on LPV (Mira and SR) stars. There was a very successful SS Cyg multiwavelength campaign.
- d) Director Mattei made a very successful trip to Jordan to attend the VII UN/ESA Basic Space Science Studies Workshop, and made several connections there.

The Membership Meeting was adjourned at 11:55 a.m., and was followed by a group photograph.

The Scientific Paper Session was held from 1:30 to 5:00p.m.. At the beginning, President Walker announced election by the council of the following officers for 1999-2000:

On Sunday morning, October 31, participants in the meeting were invited to participate in a tour of the Cape Cod National Seashore hosted by Bruce McHenry and Martha Hazen.
