MINUTES OF THE GENERAL MEETING OF THE AAVSO HELD AT BLANTYRE CASTLE, LENOX, MASS. OCTOBER 20, 1973

The Saturday morning business session was called to order by President Charles M. Good at 9:48 am. The Secretary's minutes of the May 1973 General Meeting were accepted as previously published in this <u>Journal</u>, vol. 2, no. 1 (Spring 1973).

Mr. Davis summarized his annual Treasurer's Report as of 9/30/73, as presented to and approved by the Council at its meeting on October 19, 1973. He noted in particular that the AAVSO Endowment Fund's total market value as of 9/30/73 was \$974,337. A summary of Mr. Davis' report appears elsewhere in this issue of the Journal.

The Director presented a list of 63 new regular members, and 4 new transfers to sustaining membership, approved by the Council at its meeting on 10/19/73. The names of the new regular members were not read, but a list was later posted for general inspection.

The President next called for Committee Reports. which were given by the speakers indicated as follows:

The President asked Mrs. Mayall to read the names of ten members deceased since the October 1972 meeting. Members and guests stood in respect. (The list is presented in the Director's Annual Report elsewhere in this issue.)

Mr. Good appointed Messrs. Weitzenhoffer and Welch as tellers to collect and tally votes for Council members for 1973-1975, after which the meeting was adjourned for a brief coffee break.

Following re-convening at 11:10 am, Mr. Russell Maag reported on AAVSO participation at the convention of the Astronomical League held at Omaha, Nebraska in September, 1973. Mrs. Mayall presented her Annual Report as AAVSO Director, which appears in full in this issue of the <u>Journal</u>. Observations reported to Headquarters totalled 121,899 during fiscal 1972-73 from 373 observers in 19 countries plus the USA. Dr. Glenn gave a special report on the progress of the <u>AAVSO</u> Journal since the May 1973 meeting.

Mrs. Mayall announced the Council's approval of plans to hold the Spring, 1974 meeting of the Association in conjunction with the Royal Astronomical Society of Canada at the Manitoba Museum of Man and Nature, Winnipeg, Canada on the week-end of

June 28-30, 1974, at the invitation of its Associate Director Mr. B. F. Shinn. Plans for the 1974 Fall meeting were described as not yet finalized, but Mr. Scovil renewed his invitation to hold the Spring 1975 meeting at the Stamford (Conn.) Museum and Observatory.

The Saturday morning meeting was adjourned at 11:35 am. The scheduled afternoon session was called to order at 2:20 pm by newly-elected President Charles E. Scovil. The Secretary announced the election of officers for 1973-1974 as made by the Council at its Saturday noon meeting, as follows:

Mrs. Mattei received a standing ovation, and gave a short speech of thanks and acceptance. The Secretary also announced that the Council had elected the retiring Director Mrs. Mayall to the special office of Consultant to the Director, for a period of at least one year.

The meeting was opened for papers at 2:40 pm, and the papers listed below were presented. There was a coffee break from 3:25 to 4:10 pm, and the papers session adjourned at 5:40 pm.

Following the scheduled Saturday evening banquet, illustrated talks on 1973 solar eclipse experiences were given by Past-President Edward G. Oravec, and Albert Ullman, who were on the S.S. Canberra, and by Secretary C. B. Ford who viewed the eclipse from Kenya. Dr. Dorrit Hoffleit also showed slides of her recent trip to the I.A.U. meeting in Australia. Later in the evening, skies cleared and the C. A. Post refractor was set up on the lawn of Blantyre Castle.

During the fiscal year 1972-1973 a total of 47 timings of occultations was received from three observers, Benton, Korintus, and Scovil. These timings were transmitted to the Royal Greenwich Observatory in England for processing and reduction.

In addition, several requests for information about the AAVSO occultation program were filled, and it is hoped at least some of these will produce new occultation observers.
